Tandem duo embarks on cross-country ride

Tim and Ann Newby will ride their tandem bike about 4,700 miles to help raise money for cancer research.

TERRA CEIA — The sweet has to offer, they say. fragrance of the countryside is what pushes Terra Ceia Island residents Tim and Ann Newby

Seated atop their Cannondale tandem bicycle, the pair looks out at the vast stretch of land. Cars whiz past them and fade into the distance. This is what the world

It's seeing the tulips in Holland during the springtime and eating plums right off the trees around Lake Michigan in the fall that the couple enjoys the most. It's the chance to visit the small towns off in the distance and being able to pull up to a diner and chat with the locals. For the

Newbys, the opportunities are endless.

"The best part is seeing the little towns that you miss driving 60 mph in an automobile," Ann Newby said.

And they are doing it again. The Newbys left Thursday for Washington and plan to spend the next four months seated atop

Mill Creek couple survives sinking boat

Last week, Craig and Alysa Platt spent 18 hours stranded near Egmont Key. They lived to tell the tale.

MILL CREEK — In all, Craig and Alysa Platt had spent nearly a full day stranded on their sinking 17-foot aluminum johnboat near Egmont Key. They had survived the draining, relentless heat of Florida in July as well as the biting chill of the Gulf of Mexico's late-night hours. They

used a five-gallon trashcan to bail out water from their craft, installed a working plug in the boat's bottom and rationed a bottle of cranberry juice as their only sustenance. Throughout the ordeal, Alysa even contemplated jumping overboard into sharkinfested waters.

Multiple times.

So what then, after their rescue, was first on the Platts' agenda? "I wanted Burger King," Aly-

which means they will need to travel at least 50 miles a day six days a week.

With their back wheel planted firmly in the Pacific Ocean, the couple will begin their journey in Anacortes, Wash. and will travel to St. Augustine where they will touch their front tire in the Atlantic Ocean before heading home to Terra Ceia Island.

Loaded with 90 pounds of gear, the couple will ascend the Cascade Mountains, make their way through Glacier National Park in Montana and travel along the Mississippi River. With so many sights to see it's hard to say what will be the best part of the trip, but for Ann Newby the answer is pretty clear.

"The one that rolls up to our front door," Ann Newby said with a laugh.

As the captain, Tim will be in charge of steering and shifting the bicycle's 27 gears while Ann, the stoker, will provide additional power while making sure that Tim doesn't fall asleep at the helm. Ann also will control the couple's musical selections while taking photos of the countryside.

A couple from Dunnellon will join the Newbys on the trip. The pair also will have the benefit of a motor home for the first month, which will aid in carrying the

The Newbys have traveled on bicycle throughout the United States, Canada and Europe, including such places as Switzerland, Austria, Germany, Nova Scotia and Glacier Lake National Park. The Newbys have witnessed some of the world's most beautiful landscapes and historic monuments.

Picking a favorite part of the adventure proved to be a bit of a challenge at first.

But for Tim the answer quickly comes to mind - "It's easier to stop at the bakeries," he responds with a smile.

Each new day on the bike brings about one pastry. After 25 miles, it's time for a second pastry and after 50 miles a third. While the couple longs for nice weather, Tim admits that stormy weather does have its benefits from time to time.

"When it rains that means unlimited pastries," Tim Newby

The couple began riding about 25 years ago. Shortly after they were married, the Newby's began searching for activities that they could both participate in.

"We just decided that we were going to pick out sports and hobbies that the two of us liked and could do together," Tim Newby said. "We love spending time doing things together."

They initially began riding on separate bicycles, but after learning about the tandem bicycle they quickly switched over. Since then, they've put about 62,000 miles on their old bike and nearly 2,000 miles on their new one.

But this newest venture is much more than scenery and pastries or personal glory. The couple is riding to raise money for the American Cancer Society

and cancer research. There are merging their passion for cycling with a cause that is close to their

"Everybody knows somebody who has or has had cancer or passed away from cancer," Ann Newby said. "We have friends and family members who have been affected by cancer and we want to make a difference."


