goal in mind. 'We have friends and family facing cancer and we wanted to help find a cure by raising funds for the American Cancer Society. The real heroes are the ones fighting and beating can-

cer," he said. Riding a tandem bicycle cross-country is no easy feat. The couple has endured 100degree heat and a climb and descent through the Cascade Mountains since they departed from Washington on July 28. They average 50 to 60 miles

per day but have reached the

103-mile mark on at least one occasion. The second half of the trip doesn't daunt Tim

and Ann. "It's all downhill from here,"

Tim said. There have been memorable

moments on their journey At one café a farmer told the couple to take care because they would see hail in the next half hour. Sure enough, as predicted by the "weather

hailstorm right on schedule. One night they found a beautifully manicured campground that appeared idyllic. That is until the sprinkler system went off in the middle of the night
